Letter from our Founder & CEO

Dear Supporters,

I am pleased to share that 2021 was an incredible year of growth for Workshops for Warriors. We added 18 additional welding booths to support our new Intermediate Welding Program. We added a new Intermediate Machining Laboratory with 5-axis CNC mills and seven axis robots and launched our first Intermediate Machining Class. Knowing how hard it is to study without knowing where you will be sleeping, we added housing for an additional twelve students.

We remain steadfast in our resolve. Despite the challenges of the pandemic, we are proud to have graduated 176 students who earned 2,649 nationally recognized certifications while maintaining our 94% job placement rate.

One of the high points of 2021 was being invited to New York City to speak at the prestigious SALT Conference. The conference theme was Empowering Big Ideas and, fittingly, Workshops for Warriors' unique mission and story was shared with some of the most influential global players in finance, technology, and geopolitics.

Our work received national attention in 2021 with feature stories on CBS News, Fox & Friends, Yahoo! Finance TV, NASDAQ Trade Talks, MarketWatch, Cheddar, Industry Week and the Team Never Quits Podcast with Marcus & Morgan Luttrell.

We also produced and broadcast Workshops for Warriors Fireside Chats where I was honored to speak with influential American manufacturing leaders including former General Electric CEO, Jeff Immelt; Reliance Steel & Aluminum Co. CEO, Jim Hoffman; President of CNC Software, Meghan West; and HAAS Automation Inc. Vice President, Peter Zierhut.

Workshops for Warriors graduates are working in manufacturing careers in every state of our nation. There is an atmosphere of excitement at WFW as we approach a major milestone...our 1,000th graduate! We hope you will join us for our annual Gala in April of 2022 aboard the USS Midway as we celebrate this major milestone.

I am thrilled to share that the City of San Diego has approved a construction project which will enable us to train three times as many veterans and further our shared goal of rebuilding American manufacturing, one veteran at a time.®

We are laser focused on retraining our veterans and providing them with a renewed sense of purpose to make America the world's manufacturing superpower again.



Craig Molina
Machining Graduate
Navy Veteran



Despite his skills from doing IT in the military, Craig could not find a job when he transitioned out of the Navy. He was also in the process of getting full custody of his two-year-old son, Kane, and going through a divorce. Then, his friend told him about WFW. He enrolled in the Spring 2021 machining program.

The day before school began, Craig found himself homeless. "I sat in a parking lot with Kane and called Keshia." Keshia Javis-Jones, WFW's Director of Operations, arranged for them to move into WFW's student housing while Craig trained.

In April, Craig accepted a job offer as a CNC Programmer with Hubble Power Systems. "I'm paying my bills. I have Kane full time. Everything is perfect."

Danial Monzon
Welding I & II Graduate
Army Veteran



Danial joined the Army in 2005. Throughout his 10-year Army career, he completed four combat tours, quickly became a Non-Commissioned Officer, and was honored as his division's Soldier of the Year.

He decided to leave the Army in 2013. "My PTSD hit very, very hard," he said. Danial started therapy through the VA and began thinking about his future. He found WFW and enrolled in WFW's Welding I program.

Danial graduated in April 2020 and returned to train in WFW's Welding II program in May 2021.

Toward the end of his second semester at WFW, Danial accepted a job as Lead Shop Welder with Keller Drilling International.

After four years of honorable service, Bria began planning her transition. She found Workshops for Warriors when searching the internet for welding programs. "There are a lot of welding programs out there. Workshops for Warriors focuses on vets, which I thought was really cool, plus it's a DOD Skillbridge program, so I was able to seamlessly transition into it," Bria said.

Bria graduated from WFW's Welding I program in August of 2021 and decided to enroll in WFW's intermediate Welding II course to expand her knowledge and credentials. She graduated from WFW's Welding II program in December of 2021 and was hired as a Fabricator by Vortex Engineering.

"Even if you have a small spark of interest in trying welding, try Workshops for Warriors. For women especially, go for it. You can do it, and it's fun."

Jedediah Maldonado Machining Graduate Navy Veteran



After graduating high school, Jedediah was struggling to make ends meet, working three jobs while attending college. "So," he said, "I decided to join the Navy in 2007."

After serving eight years with the Navy, Jedediah joined the reserves and graduated with a Bachelor's Degree in Mechanical Engineering.

"Right after I graduated, I was job searching. I asked myself, 'What can I change to make myself stand out?'" He found WFW and enrolled in the Spring 2021 machining class.

About one month into the program, Jedediah submitted his resume to several employers and was offered a job as Undersea Mechanical Engineer by Rathyeon Company. He began his new career after graduating from WFW in April 2021.

KJ joined the Marine Corps shortly after graduating from high school. As the end of her military contract neared, she began thinking about welding, a skill she learned in high school.

Then, she heard about WFW and enrolled in WFW's Welding I program while she was still active duty. After graduating, she signed up for WFW's Welding II program.

Nearing her second graduation from WFW, and with official military veteran status, KJ accepted a job as a welder with Santa Fe Springs Winwater. "I couldn't be more excited," she said.

When asked her thoughts on women entering the male-dominated welding field, KJ said, "Any female can accomplish and do it. I want to do this for the rest of my life."

Luis served four honorable years with the Marine Corps. "Transitioning out of the military is one of the hardest things someone can go through. I was in a position where I couldn't provide for my wife and my three-year-old son. It broke my heart."

He saw a flyer with information about WFW and enrolled. "The experience at Workshops for Warriors has been everything I thought it would be and better," he said.

After completing 16 weeks of training, Luis earned 10 nationally recognized welding credentials. "Workshops for Warriors set me up with credentials above the standard of what any welder starting out is required to have," he said. "It makes us — the students — stand out even more when applying for jobs."




Students enrolled in WFW's machining program in 2021 earned a total of 1,537 machining certifications.


